It is difficult to believe that our first class of students is graduating this June. It does not seem so long ago that I

was sitting alone on the floor of my living room in pajamas stuffing envelopes with “Congratulations! You’ve been accepted to International High School!” letters. The Student Government at the International High School at Lafayette (IHS at Lafayette) is currently in the planning stages of an awareness campaign to address the human crisis in Darfur.

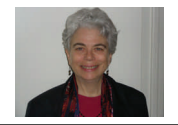
Last month, all students gathered in the auditorium for a presentation with guest speakers from Me to We, a Toronto-based human rights awareness organization. The presenta-

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The International High School at Lafayette (IHS at Lafayette) is the seventh school in the Internationals Network for Public Schools and will celebrate its first graduation this June. It opened in September 2005 under the leadership of Michael Soet, who began his career with Internationals as a student teacher at The Manhattan International High School (MIHS) in February 1999. Michael took on successive leadership positions at MIHS, including that of Assistant Principal, before opening IHS at Lafayette with a staff of nine, which included experienced teachers from both MIHS and Brooklyn International High School (BIHS).

IHS at Lafayette first opened in Canarsie, a part of Brooklyn with few English language learner immigrants.

The location proved difficult for the new school, as parents were wary of long student commutes – most students traveled well over an hour just to get there. Despite the recruitment challenges, the school grew steadily. Happily, in the summer of 2008, the school moved to the Lafayette Education Complex (formerly Lafayette High School) in Bensonhurst, Brooklyn, near to public transportation and easily accessible to various diverse immigrant communities in Brooklyn.

Since opening in 2005, IHS at Lafayette has grown not only in terms of its student body, but in the knowledge, skills and overall capacity of its faculty and leaders to successfully address the needs of its immigrant students. Jon Harriman, a science teacher and coach who worked at Brooklyn International, Flushing International and the Internationals Network, joined the

school as Assistant Principal in 2007.

The school has had strong support from Emily Bristle, the Coordinator of Special Programs, throughout its start up as well as from Sara Newman, the principal mentor, who founded Brooklyn International High School in 1994.

These two positions, and many other services, activities and programs such as New Teacher Institutes and Curriculum Libraries were provided by the Internationals Network as part of our extensive and intensive support for both existing and new, growing schools in our network.

As we develop our existing and planned schools in New York City, it is clear that Internationals is serving a significant portion of New York City's English language learners. Internationals Net-

work for Public Schools has expanded the number of International High Schools from 4 in 2004 to 12 as of August 2009 and is presently serving 19% of all recent immigrants in high schools in NYC and is building a strong network in the Bay Area for our two young schools in Oakland and (soon!) San Francisco.

Congratulations to Michael and his staff for substantially increasing the opportunities for recently arrived immigrant students in Brooklyn. This school is on track to graduating a large majority of its first senior class, who are prepared to enter college and participate actively as adults in our democratic society. This school, like all International High Schools, turns the immigrant dream into the reality of a bright and prosperous future!

On Tuesday, April 28th and Wednesday, April 29th, students from the Brooklyn International High School visited The Tolerance Center through service-learning grants from NY Learn & Serve. Students participated in interactive museum exhibits discussing the ideas of tolerance ranging from the 1st Amendment rights of freedom of speech to

genocides throughout history. They saw startling imagery that made them think about the power of words, how they are used, and the consequences of them. raise awareness on May 22nd at NYU in a Social Justice Expo. This Expo will be held with other schools such as Pan American International High School, Validus Preparatory Academy and the Facing History School. Students are very excited to exhibit their videos, artwork, and websites in an effort to show everyone that indeed, one person can make a difference.

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where everyone is a learner working collaboratively. The students have learned to navigate working in groups on projects these last four years and so have we. Together, staff and students have repeatedly
